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

Society of Medallists

The 2022 convention of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association, the first since the onset of COVID-19 that forced its cancellation for two years, took place from Tuesday July 19 to Sunday July 24 at the Delta Ottawa City Centre Hotel.

This national "coin collectors" convention is always a special time providing the opportunity for old friendships to be renewed, new friendships to be made, the buying and selling of collectibles, presentations of awards and a busy schedule of authoritative guest speakers during two days of symposium presentations scheduled prior to the actual convention activities.

This year, through the efforts of a group of art medal supporters, we had some excellent speakers and interesting displays centred on medallic art.

During the first symposium day, William Waychison spoke about the artistic work of our MASC Past President Susan Taylor. Some highlights of this talk are presented as a separate article in this newsletter.

In the morning of the second symposium day Susan Taylor was a speaker herself with a presentation with the intriguing title Recycling Medals: Exploring the Concept of Repurposing Ideas and Design Elements as an Environmental Theme. In her talk she explained the new computer-based work methods she has adopted. It is now possible to sculpt using a computer application and to establish in the computer detailed three dimensional images that can be resized and reused as a need for a particular design element may be appropriate. Moreover, once a new rendering is complete, automated methods are available for three-dimensional sculpting and also master die production. This talk was supplemented by a display of examples of Susan's work, which drew a great deal of attention from the attendees.

On the afternoon of the same day, we were able to set up our MASC non-competitive convention display. It comprised four cases. One case featured members' medals under the theme title Medalling into the Light and three more cases were devoted to the work of Dora de Pedery-Hunt. This was an amalgamation of contributions from Ildiko Hencz, and Ian and Joan McCausland, Lorraine Wright and Paul Petch. It made for a display that attracted a good amount of attention and conversation, all of which demonstrated a general interest in art medals.

Another art medal display, which had been assembled over many years and was presented in eight display cases, was the Society of Medallists subscription series produced from 1930 until 1995. Mr. Thomas Uram is the owner of the collection and he went to the expense of hiring a professional designer to show his collection in a most attractive manner.

The first true day of the convention got underway at 10 a.m. on Friday July 22 with speeches by the presidents of the American Numismatic Association and the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association. It concluded with an official ribbon cutting. In the ribbon cutting party from left to right are: Dr. Ralph Ross, President American Numismatic Association; Steve Woodland, President Royal Canadian Numismatic Association; Marie Lemay, President and CEO of the Royal Canadian Mint; Jacob Lipson, President Ottawa Numismatic Society.

A special breakfast is arranged for all the spouses/ partners that registered for the convention. Once again Susan Taylor made herself available at this event to explain her artistic work and to display some examples. By all reports the talk was very interesting and very well received.

With so much activity and what seemed like a nonstop schedule our time at the convention passed very quickly. Upon reflection, it was wonderful to attend an event in person after two years of cancellations, especially when the event had been so well planned, so enjoyable and ultimately very successful.

Susan Taylor – Canadian Artist, Senior Engraver at the Royal Canadian Mint: A Selection of her Coins and Medals



On Wednesday July 20 Mr. Waychison gave a talk that began with a short biography of Susan Taylor followed by a review of many of the coins she worked on during her years at the Royal Canadian Mint. The next section highlighted commissions for the Royal Canadian Geographical Society and the final section focused on her other medals, especially art medals.

Some highpoints of the many coins reviewed were:

2002 - 50th Anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II Accession to Throne Sterling \$1

2004 - Centennial of Jack Miner Bird Sanctuary Specimen \$1

2004 - Clouded Sulphur Butterfly Sterling Silver 50-cents

2005 - Monarch Butterfly Sterling Silver 50-cents

2006 - Short-tailed Swallowtail Butterfly Sterling Silver 50-cents

2005 - Marking the visit of Pope John Paul II Sterling Silver \$10

2006 - Iris Versicolor \$350 Gold

2008 - Vancouver 2010 Olympic Games: Towards Confederation \$2500 Kilo Gold (Winner "2010 Most Inspirational Coin Award", presented at 2010 World Money Fair, Berlin)

Among the medals created for the Royal Canadian Geographical Society (RCGS) are:

The Martin Bergmann Award

The Camsell Medal (1999) is named after Society founder Dr. Charles Camsell, geologist, and first president 1930-1941 to recognize outstanding volunteer service by a Fellow of the Society. Susan Taylor was a recipient of this medal in 2021.

The RCGS 80th Anniversary Medal (2009) featuring bilingual name/text, the RCGS Compass Rose, a wind-blown pine tree, and dates.

The 3M Canada Environmental Innovation Award was established in 2009 to recognise outstanding individuals in business, government, academia or community organizations whose innovative contributions to environmental change are benefiting Canada and Canadians.

The Martin Bergmann Award was founded in 2012 for distinguished accomplishments in Arctic Leadership in the Canadian Arctic or excellence for a recent outstanding or lifetime achievement.

The Alex Trebek Medal for Geographic Literacy was first issued 2019 based on the renaming of the Society's Geographic Literacy Award. It is presented annually to an educator in acknowledgement of the late Alex Trebek's support for the Society, particularly its educational programs for Canadian Youth.

In the grouping of other medals created by Susan. Taylor, these art medals stood out:

Vanquished Medal (2011)

Tom Thomson Medal (1998) was Susan's first art medal. The obverse shows Thomson beside a sculpted rendition of his familiar Jack Pine image. The reverse shows " ... a printed image of the painting 'The Jack Pine' framed by a decorative border."

Vanquished Medal (2011) portrays a Saint George-styled, horse-mounted, cloaked male with a spear attacking a dragon, utilizing the clever use of a steel pin to deliver a clean impression of the spear.

O Canada Medal (2014) shows the recycled Jack Pine from the 2009 RCGS 80th Anniversary Medal executed in lucite and mounted on a wooden base.

While we were Sleeping (2015) was inspired by a visit to the Italian Carrara marble quarries and recognizes the resulting ravaging of the country side. This experience moved Susan to create a medal that captures a 16th century marble sculpture of a Sleeping Nymph from the Offizi Gallery in Florence on the obverse and A view of the quarry with roads angling up the side of the mountain. This was Susan's entry at FIDEM 2016.

The Remembrance Medal (2016) on its obverse shows a portrait of a young soldier wearing a Brodie helmet, framed in barbed wire that represents youth sacrificed through loss of life, imprisonment, and emotional trauma while the reverse shows "the poppies emerging from the barbed wire to symbolize the loss of life through the spent flowers; the flowers in bloom are the survivors; and the young buds are the future, lest we forget." This medal won the American Medallic Sculpture Association (AMSC) 2016 American Medal of the Year Award.

The FIDEM Congress Medal (2018) obverse portrays elements of Canadian Flora, water, and sky as well as RIBBONS with text indicating the conference and the reverse portrays a mother reading to a child under a star covered sky displaying the Aurora Borealis.

In conclusion Mr. Waychison stressed it was his intent to show the talent, skill, and design research Susan Taylor employs in preparing and executing her designs.



ART IN THE GARDEN

August 27th and 28th 2022 saw 10 talented artist display their work in my garden as well as throughout my basement studio and gallery. Luckily our basement level is accessible by a winding path. The garden is surrounded by 15 foot cedars so it is a very private oasis. This provided a wow factor as people walked down the winding path into the garden. We had set up a registration desk so we were able to keep track of the 180 visitors.

Scott McKinnon's marble dragon (Ogopogo) was one of the first pieces of sculpture to be encountered. He was comfortably residing on the garden bench. Inside the house Scott had set up his display of medals which did not disappoint. His largest bronze medallion also depicts a green dragon, in the centre of the medallion picture. People were very engaged by the medallions and asked lots of questions.







The next piece of art one encountered was "Birth of a Lotus", a painting by Kenna Graff whose colorful work was exhibited pool side. Her new garden creations graced the outside walls of the house.



Sculptor -Nino Fabbro 's marble seals and rhodonite salmon adorned the pond and waterfall.



Kenna's medallion exhibit was exhibited on the oak hutch in the family room. The medallions really glowed under the lights. Kenna's themes of western Canada could be clearly seen and were admired.



Jeweler-Cheryl Murphy's jewelry covered the pool table and was much sought after.



While Fibre artist -Annabel Stanley's quirky creations could be found throughout the show.



Angel Calderer's marble named "Bonding" was displayed by the pool and was a talking point. He had six large stone sculptures around the garden including a large alabaster piece and a warrior piece of bronze. His one of a kind gold and silver jewelry drew much attention as did his medals which he displayed in shadow boxes. I have made a collage of them to show the work .





We served home -made lemonade and cookies so people wandered leisurely among the sculptures. The weather cooperated although we did have a rainstorm later on Saturday. In spite of this people kept coming. Three more of the artists were Val Eibner who made some stunning glass pieces which absolutely complemented the garden theme.



Judy Burns' photography evoked nature and wide open spaces. She too used imagery of trees. Barbara Morin's quirky collages drew lots of comments.





My bronze masks with their steel stands were set off by the green cedar hedges. They stood like sentinels around the garden. My medal exhibit was shown in an old cabinet in my gallery area and commanded attention.

People wanted to hold the medallions and to hear the stories associated with them. In all 42 medallions were displayed. They were well received and definitely added to the flavor of the show. We were also delighted that medallions were purchased as well as larger pieces of sculpture and art.
